She was on the South African Institute for Sensory Integration (SAISI) Board from 1997 - 2009 and is a Sensory Integration Treatment lecturer . Wallace is Clinical Director of Polkaspot Early Intervention Centre in Cape Town, which hosted the first DIR®:Floortime™ conference in SA in 2010. Wallace is the founder of SPOTlight Trust SA which aims to provide much needed intervention in disadvantaged communities by empowering adult caregivers and educators with tools to support children with special needs. Her Masters dissertation examined Occupational Therapy –Sensory Integration (OT-SI) efficacy with autistic pre-school children from a variety of socio-economic backgrounds.
